

Some Elamites names in Mesopotamian sources — Eleven out of the following fifteen names are recorded in Ur III (Nos. 1.3-8.10.12.13.15), three in OB (Nos. 2.11.14) and one in LB (No. 9). ¹¹ refer to my *The Elamite Onomasticon* (Naples 1984).

1. *Am-ma-za-za* (fem. UET 3, 51 ; ₁₁ 7.290).
2. *Ha-aš-tu-tu* (ARMT 26/2, 397, 7 ; cf. *Beitr. z. Namenforschung* NF 18, 1983, p. 100).
3. *Hal-ti* (McNeil, *Mess. Texts*, 130, 30, designated as NIM ; ₁ 25).
4. *Hu-ba-na* (name of a field) is hardly Sumerian (as apparently understood by Sauren, *Genf*, p. 311a, s.v.), but the Elamite DN *Humpan* (prob. used as PN, ₁ 48).
5. *Hu-ba-nu-du* (Watson, *Cat.* 57, 5) probably contains *Humpan* as well.
6. *Hu-un-nu-du-uk* (Watson, *Cat.* 318, 4. seal ; ₁₁ 49.282 ?).
7. *Hu-un-zu-lu* (MVN 6, 500 ; ₁₁ 49.300).
8. *I-ri-dah* (D.I. Owen, JCS 33, 1981, p. 256 : PTS 813, 2 ; ₁₁ 75.236a).
9. *Ku-uk-mu-ra-te-e* (L.T. Doty in E. Leichty and P. Gerardi [eds], *A Scientific Humanist : Studies in Memory of A. Sachs*, Philadelphia 1988, p. 102 with n. 28 : YOS 20, 72, 5f. ; with *kuk*, ₁ 110 ?).
10. *Me-ri-iš* (MVN 7, 9 r. 3 ; ₁ 145a).
11. « *Sinti-hulluriš* » begins with Akkad. *simtum* (stat. constr.) according to D. Charpin (*Mél. Steve*, p. 136), in which case the name would be hybrid. But since its bearer was an Elamite, *simtu* here may be an Akkadian popular etymology for *timpt* (₁ 246).
12. *Še-el-ha-ak-ni-ba-aš* (MVN 13, 695, 35 ; *šilhak-*, ₁ 220b).
13. *Še-er-na-pí-ir* (FAOS 16, 900 r. 2 ; ₁ 157b [DN used as PN] ; hardly Akk. *Šērum-nawir* as –BI– does not stand for –wi_x– ; note also the lack of mimation).

14. Ši-ir-ma-pu-[uk(?)] (father of *B/Pur-ri-ia*, see C.B.F. Walker *apud* D. Collon, *Catalogue of the Western Asiatic Seals in the British Museum*, Cylinder Seals III, London 1986, p. 108 *ad* 179 ; ₁₁ 139.224 ?).

15. *Tan-na-hu-ti* (ITT 6787, cf. *Iran* 25, 1987, p. 5 ; ₁₁ 153.241).

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
