


The Neo-Babylonian royal inscription of the Bibliothèque Nationale et Universitaire de Strasbourg — The collection of Bibliothèque Nationale et Universitaire de Strasbourg houses hundreds of cuneiform tablets from the Presargonic area down to the Neo-Babylonian period¹. Among them an unpublished brick of Nebuchadnezzar was discovered and copied in May 1996. The brick is labelled no. 1. (dimensions of the frame : 15 * 11,3 cm) in the cuneiform collection of the Cabinet Numismatique. It is presented here by the kind permission of Daniel Bornemann, curator of the Cabinet Numismatique. We find the following well-known inscription² of Nebuchadnezzar on it :

Transliteration :

- 1) $dN\ddot{A}$ -ku-du-úr-ri-!ÙRU!
- 2) LUGAL KÁ.DINGIR.RA^{ki}
- 3) za-!nin¹ É.SAG.ÍL
- 4) ù É.!ZI!.DA
- 5) IBILA a-ša-!re-du!
- 6) ša $dN\ddot{A}.$!IBILA.ÙRU!
- 7) LUGAL KÁ.!DINGIR.RA^{ki}!

Translation :

- 1) (I am) Nebuchadnezzar,
- 2) king of Babylon,
- 3) provider of Esagil
- 4) and Ezida,
- 5) first born son
- 6) of Nabopolassar,
- 7) king of Babylon.
